THE QUALIFICATION

We've created a qualification that's accessible, flexible and straightforward to administer.

Your students have the opportunity to develop their knowledge of Latin vocabulary and linguistic structures. They'll also gain linguistic skills that will help in the study and application of English and other languages.

Teachers have freedom to choose the topic and question for the Roman culture task(s) so they can tailor the task(s) to areas which their students will find interesting or link the task(s) to a visit to a local Roman site. If you would like further guidance and a second pair of eyes to look at potential task titles, OCR will be able to offer guidance on the suitability of the title.

ASSESSMENT

Entry Level Certificate in Latin consists of two language tests and a Roman culture task or tasks.

The two Language tests together represent 50% of the overall Entry Level Certificate in Latin. Students must take one Test 1 and one Test 2 from the bank of tests available on Teach Cambridge.

Students must also complete a Roman culture task or tasks. They can choose between one 400 word task or two 200 word tasks. This also represents 50% of the overall Entry Level Certificate in Latin.

These tests and tasks are marked by the centre and then a sample is moderated by OCR.

THE QUALIFICATION

Our GCSE Ancient History qualification provides a romp through some of the most exciting parts of Roman and Greek history, focusing on the key individuals and events that helped shape the ancient world. Students will have the chance to look at defining characters from the ancient world such as Alexander the Great, Cleopatra and Hannibal, defining events including the Battle of Thermopylae, the foundation of Rome and the creation of democracy.

Students will study two period studies, giving students the opportunity to study how the Persian Empire grew from a small kingdom in the Iranian plateau to become the world's first super power. Students will also study the early beginnings of the Rome from Romulus and Remus through to the beginning of the Roman Republic.

Linked to each of these period studies are a choice of three depth studies. These allow teachers to create a coherent course whatever depth studies you take, providing students with a well-rounded understanding of the ancient world.

GCSE Ancient History equips students with the skills needed to be successful in the modern world, most crucially being able to critically analyse the available evidence to determine what they can actually learn about the events and characters they have studied.



THE QUALIFICATION

Our AS and A Level in Ancient History have been designed to help students develop their understanding of the ancient world and its legacy in today's society. They combine engaging and exciting content with clearly laid out requirements and straightforward assessment.

For both AS and A Level, students' study two compulsory period studies: one Greek and one Roman. The Greek period study focuses on the changing relationships between states during the 5th century. The Roman period study focuses on the Julio-Claudian dynasty, looking at the key characters of Augustus, Tiberius, Caligula, Claudius and Nero.

For the A Level, students get to study two depth studies: one Greek and one Roman. The depth studies link to the period study providing students with a coherent and rewarding study of the ancient world. The depth studies on offer focus on the following areas:

- Politics and Society of Sparta, 478–404 BC
- Politics and Culture of Athens, c.460-c.399 BC
- The Rise of Macedon, c.359-323 BC
- The Breakdown of the Late Republic, 88-31 BC
- The Flavians, AD 68-96
- Ruling Roman Britain, AD 43-c.128
