This new teacher guide covers the key reading skills needed to help students effectively analyse writers' use of language and structure. The resource takes texts and questions from our past papers and uses these as a basis for classroom activities that are broken down into exercises on language, structure and use of relevant subject terminology. Each activity includes a clear teaching focus and summary points so you can pick these up to use straight away in the classroom or set a particular exercise for homework.

Developing extended writing skills – Delivery guide

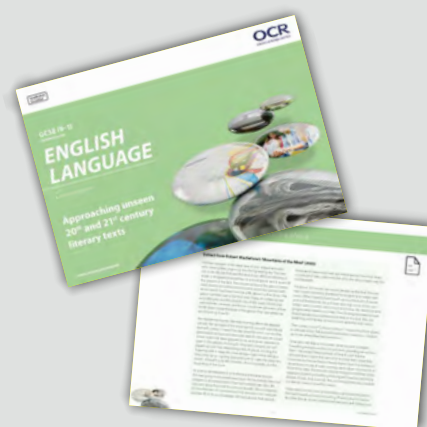
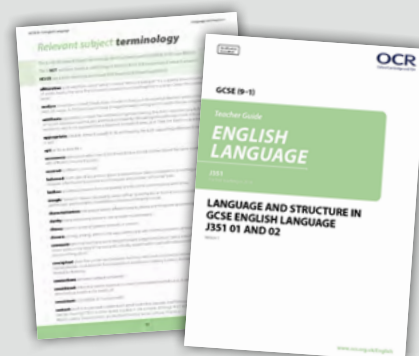

This guide can be used both to recap and develop the building blocks needed for effective writing. The focus helps to ensure that students' practice and preparation includes use and organisation of content, as well as vocabulary, spelling and grammar. You can use the headings in this guide to organise activities so that students can recap and practise the full range of skills separately. The activities build towards students combining these to create engaging texts in a range of forms – tasks that you could set as homework or as part of exam preparation.

Approaching 20th and 21st century literary texts – Delivery guide

This guide focuses on ways to develop students' confidence to engage effectively with unseen literary texts. It offers practical suggestions using examples from a range of texts. The activities are structured around three broad sets of skills with a clear progression between each set: 'the basics', analysing and evaluating texts and comparing texts. This means you can differentiate activities to suit your students' needs, or use a particular set of activities to gauge where students are at when they return to the classroom and to develop their skill level. Activities are suitable for the classroom or for independent learning.

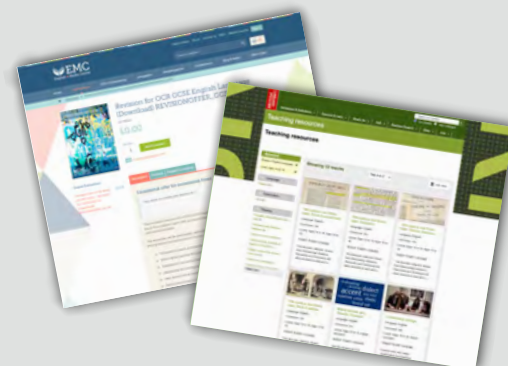
